Dear Friends,

"Our Saviour comes, the resurrection of the dead. A new light shines out upon the darkness of the night. Our Saviour comes to be born of a virgin as the prophets foretold. As we draw close to the Feast of Christmas in this our 25th anniversary year, the truth of these timeless words stands out for

us. When 300 people gathered on our lawn last 31st May to celebrate the Eucharist, against a background of apparent rejection of the Catholic Church in this country, they affirmed the deep human need for God which He is ever ready to satisfy.

We were overjoyed that so many people from all over the Cork area and further afield were able to come and be part of a wonderful celebration. We renew our thanks to Bishop William Crean, and the 9 Priests of the diocese who concelebrated the Mass from the balcony of our house.



We also thank Dominic Finn and the Cobh Cathedral Youth Choir for the beauty and atmosphere of new life which they brought to the celebration.

and the 1 Brigade Army Band who provided entertainment afterwards.



Centenary of the end of the 1st World War

As Admiralty House was such a central part of the WW1 story here in Cobh, it is fitting that 2 war memorials have been erected in our Bible Garden. On 2nd June, the Jutland Memorial was unveiled. 20 naval men from Cobh lost their lives in the battle of Jutland on 31st May 1916. Following an ecumenical service in the Cathedral, a short procession led by Piper Adam Duggan and a symbolic pall bearer detachment from the Irish Naval Service Reserve, the flag standards of the Royal Naval Association of Ireland and descendants carrying the 20 caps



moved to our grounds. There sculptor James McLoughlin's monument was unveiled by County Mayor, Cllr Declan Hurley and blessed by Father John McCarthy and the Reverend Paul Arbuthnot.

Wreaths were laid and a Bugler sounded the *Last Post*. This was followed by a two-minute silence which was concluded with a bell being rung eight times – as traditionally used to mark the change of watch on ships.

On 11th November, another plaque was unveiled commemorating all those who lost their lives in WW1. We were very edified so see a crowd gather in torrential rain for this ceremony!

Meanwhile the Cause for Canonisation of our Mother Foundress has been progressing, with the Vatican commission visiting several of our houses, including our own, to interview those who wished to testify to their knowledge of her sanctity. On 15th August the opening of her birthplace in Grancey-le-Chateau was a wonderful success and very blessed. Our Sisters in France and others who went to join them worked very hard to get everything ready.

The Parish Priest of Grancey, Fr Vincent Sauer, celebrated the Mass in the town square under a marquee. After the homily the mayor formally handed over to our Mother General the keys of the
