


TYBURN TALK

SACRED HEART 2022

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Dear Friends of Tyburn,

St. John Eudes was among the many promoters of devotion to the Sacred Heart over the centuries. He was a 17th-century priest in France who was deeply impacted by St. Francis de Sales. Here is one of St. John Eudes' prayers that he used to help promote devotion to the Sacred Heart.

O Heart all loveable and all loving of my Saviour, be the Heart of my heart, the Soul of my soul, the Spirit of my spirit, the Life of my life and the sole principle of all my thoughts, words and actions, of all the faculties of my soul and of all my senses, both interior and exterior. Amen.

Most worthy and great in the Church Militant is the holy Sacraments-the Sacrament of Baptism by which we are made children of God; Confirmation, which gives us the Holy Spirit; Penance, which washes away our sins and restores us to God's favour; the Blessed Eucharist, which feeds our souls with the Flesh and Blood of the Son of God, making us live by His life; Matrimony, which forms children for God, to serve and honour Him on earth and to love and praise Him forever in heaven; Holy Orders, which gives to the Church priests who shall continue the functions of the great High Priest and thus cooperate with Him in the great work of the salvation of the world, and Extreme Unction, which at our departure from this world fortifies us against the enemies of our salvation, who at that last hour make their final endeavor to ruin us. The seven Sacraments are so many inexhaustible fountains of grace and holiness, which have their source in the immense ocean of the Sacred Heart of our Saviour; they are so many

flames of a divine furnace from which proceed all spiritual blessings. But the brightest of those flames is the most Holy Eucharist. It is true that this great Sacrament is a compendium of all the wonders of the power, wisdom and goodness of God, but it is also true that it is one of the fruits of the incomparable Heart of Jesus and one of the flames of that wondrous furnace. Jesus waits for us in the Blessed Sacrament. He waits for our little Acts of faith, adoration, love, thanksgiving, repentance, reparation and charity that we can offer Him as we contemplate - His Divine Majesty - in the Blessed Sacrament. St. Alphonsus Liguori wrote: "Of all devotions, that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the Sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us". The Eucharist is a priceless treasure: By not only celebrating the Eucharist, but also by praying before It outside of Mass, we are enabled to make contact with the very wellsprings of Grace.

Here at Tyburn Convent we have Perpetual Adoration. We have our doors open to the public from 6.30 am until 8.30 pm. Holy Mass each weekday is 7.30 am and on Saturdays and Sundays it is 9 am.

Commemoration of the Tyburn Martyrs



On the 4th of May, we had our annual commemeration of the Tyburn Martyrs which was very well attended. The Ceremony began with the Divine Office of None and finished with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. It included a

reading from The Passion of the Carthusian Martyrs from the account of Dom Maurice Chauncey which was begun in the Chapel and finished in the Crypt of the Martyrs. There was the Litany of the Carthusian Martyrs with the ceremony of the Roses, a Prayer for England and some hymns. Afterwards, those attending had the opportunity to visit the tomb of our holy Mother Foundress, The Servant of God Mother Marie Adele Garnier and the shrine of St Joseph.

Holy Saturday Cleaning






Tyburn Animals



As many of you already know the "Tyburn Zoo" is booming, with quails and rabbits being added to our collection of chickens. We began with three New Zealand White rabbits - aptly named Abraham, Sarah and Rachel, as they went on to have many children!

There are also

two Giant Whites, one earning the name of Goliath. Goliath came to us from a domesticated background and appears to have picked up some dog and cat-like habits along the way – he prefers human attention and pats over food and doesn't mind the odd splash of water, while also happy to sit on a knee for petting. Three nursing bunnies currently have a sum of 23 babies who are doing well and look very cute!





The rabbits are sold on for pets and the chickens and quails are obligingly supplying us with eggs. The rabbits and chickens are also helpful for the disposal of vegetable scraps and in turn providing us with fertilizer for the garden – recycling at its best!









Surrounding the animals are beds of vegetables, berries and flowers. Summer is a great time in the garden and the plants include potatoes, tomatoes, garlic, courgettes, pak choi, cucumbers, squash, watercress, raspberries, apples and more. They are beautiful in the garden and delicious on the plate!



The watercress is being grown around a pond that contains some koi carp fish. Aquaponics is the technical name given to this type of growing as the water is being pumped from the fish pond through the watercress and back into the pond. We were planning on having "fish 'n' chips" one day but unfortunately this fish have not grown much because the pond is too small

These blessed Spirits filled the Martyrs with superhuman strength, soothed their pains, and consoled them in their suffering, so that it became easy and even pleasant for them to bear the torments that their brutal enemies invented with such fiendish ingenuity.

What a lesson for us! Why do we not call with confidence on our dear Angels in our sufferings? They are only too eager to come to our assistance.


This year we have some very good cash raffle prizes.
