We are sure you were all as filled with joy as we were to witness that wonderful moment when our Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV, stepped out onto the balcony after his election! Our prayers are with him as he willingly takes up this heavy cross. May the Holy Spirit guide and enlighten him with His grace as the 266th successor of St Peter. In speaking about the parable of the Sower in his first General Audience, our Holy Father tells us "that God is ready to 'waste away' for us and that Jesus is willing to die in order to transform our life...Let us ask the Lord" he said, "for the grace to always welcome this seed that is His Word. And if we realise we are not a fruitful soil, let us not be discouraged, but let us ask Him to work on us more to make us a better terrain."

You will all be remembered in a very special way as we celebrate that Feast so dear to our Congregation – that of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, to Whom we are totally consecrated. Our Mother Foundress - the Servant of God, Mother Marie Adele Garnier - wrote that "The desire to respond to the call of the Heart of Jesus living in the Eucharist, has inspired this little work" so as to "be able to offer to this Divine Reality the solace He continually yearns for in His love for us." We are called "to be consumed with love in the presence of the Sacred Host containing Jesus, God and Man, His living and divine Heart" and through our life of worship and adoration "we seek to draw down, through the Heart of Jesus, abundant graces for the Holy Father, the Church and for the entire human family."



We will now share with you some of our monastery activities.

Our Mother General worked very hard on her visit with us to help us to be able to live our monastic life as well as we can. Mother has arranged the area where our

inner enclosure is to be. This is necessary for us since our life is one of cloistered contemplation which the Church describes as "a very particular way of living and expressing the paschal mystery of Christ." It means to be "hidden with Christ in God, to be 'love in the heart of the Church', to share the fatigue, the misery and the hopes of all mankind in a more profound sense, in the Heart of Christ."

Our Sister M. Bernadette (to the right) has been very busy putting up the fence which will mark off the part of our inner enclosure beside the monastery. Having been a dairy farmer in New Zealand, she is used to putting up fences! In the photo below, you might be able to make out the row of trees we have planted along the front part of our boundary.





Rev. Mother Prioress and Sr. M. Bernadette have been working hard planting trees down the side after putting up a fence to prevent the cattle having a nibble of the cypress trees. They are curious, but after being so well fed and fat on the grain our friend Eamon and his son are giving them, they are quite satisfied without any extra salad!


